SCHOLARSHIP + STEWARDSHIP = SUCCESS

The American Council for Construction Education is looking for great investment opportunities! No, we're not talking stocks+ and bonds. We are talking about investing in the future of our industry by supporting Construction Management education for your future faculty.

Those pursuing a graduate degree in Construction Management with the goal of educating future generations are investing much time and treasure. And while each situation is unique, the benefit of scholarship dollars is undeniable. More importantly however, an industry-based scholarship builds a connection with your future colleagues and creates a sense of belonging.

We are fortunate and pleased to offer two scholarships for those enrolled in ACCE accredited construction programs each year. Both are named in honor of Dr. Daniel Dupree, Professor Emeritus of Mathematics of The University of North Louisiana (University of Louisiana, Monroe) and one of ACCE's founders and Executive Director from 1989 to 2004.

The Dupree Construction Education Scholarship Award of *up to* \$5,000 was established in 2008 and awarded to a practitioner who is enrolled in a postgraduate program at an institution with an undergraduate program accredited by ACCE with the intent to enter into a career as a faculty member in an ACCE-accredited construction management program.

In 2009, a separate Dupree Construction Education Fund Scholarship in conjunction with the very generous grant from National Housing Endowment was created. This award of up to a \$5,000 scholarship yearly to help with expenses for a postgraduate candidate in construction management with an emphasis on Residential Construction. The applicant should have experience in residential construction and a desire for a career as a faculty member in an ACCE accredited construction management program.

Can you think of any of your Masters or Ph.D. students with practical industry experience, who would benefit from and are qualified for ACCE's scholarship dollars? This is where we could use an assist from you. You know your students' capabilities and interests ~ and ACCE needs your help to inform and encourage those qualified to complete the scholarship application process.

Why Accreditation – Why ACCE?

Why Accreditation? - Accreditation is a voluntary process of external peer review to assure that colleges and universities hold a high level of quality assurance and continued improvement as processes within the organization. There are two general types of accreditation: institutional and specialized. The American Council for Construction Education (ACCE) is a specialized, programmatic accreditor; a non-profit organization which depends on volunteers to establish standards by which a program is evaluated, and reviews programs for initial or on-going accreditation.

Programs which choose to be accredited are willing to step-up and be challenged to be evaluated against the high standards which have been developed by the program's peers – practitioners and academics who have established themselves as knowledgeable about the industry and know how to judge the quality of a program against the requirements of the accreditor – ACCE. The stake holders who benefit from accreditation are: students and their parents; construction company owners; and the owners of construction projects. They all can be assured the construction graduate has been exposed to a quality education for construction: contemporary in its curriculum content, which is taught by exceptional professors, supported by institutions of known quality and enriched by the support of an industry advisory group that makes the construction educational experience be connected in reality.

Why ACCE? – The American Council for Construction Education was founded by a partnership of industry associations/practitioners and academics who specialize in educating the construction executives of the future. Over 40 years ago, executives of construction companies realized that an engineering degree did not prepare them to manage the process of construction or run/manage a business. Engineering was/is the science of matching physical sciences to the design of physical projects and their operating systems to make them safe and operational. Nothing in the curriculum or the personalities of the typical engineer brought the talents, interest or capabilities to manage people or organizations.

Since 1974 when ACCE was incorporated, it has and continues to keep its standards contemporary with the practices of the industry. In 2014, ACCE released and began to implement its 4th evolution of the required standards. The current

outcomes-based standards are the result of many hours of working with practitioners across the US and the fine-tuning from well respected educators specializing in construction education.

ACCE is inclusive of all types of construction, not focusing on any one type of construction or contracting process: commercial, residential, industrial, civil and heavy highway, sub-and specialized contracting: all are supported by the education provided by ACCE-accredited programs.

The governance of ACCE is completely transparent and inclusive. Founded by a joint effort of academia and industry, the governing documents of ACCE require a balance of industry with academia: on its Board of trustees; within the committee structures; and on the visiting teams which go to the individual programs and report to ACCE how they view the programs against the standards for accreditation. This “partnership” provides assurance there is balance in the perspective of the Council AND in the governance, everything ACCE does has the assurance of that balance.

ACCE is more than an accreditor: the mission of ACCE begins with “promote quality construction education. . .” This focus is to provide support, training, networking and the opportunity to lead to all with the talents, interests and passion for sharing quality aspects of education that can continue to improve all programs which choose to be ACCE-accredited.

The American Council for Construction Education is the gold-standard for a rigorous construction-focused accreditation. It sets a program apart from those who are not accredited and provides a notable status on campus for the institution's programs which are accredited (or not).

And ACCE creates an inclusive atmosphere and environment for all involved. Rest assured ACCE will continue to promote quality construction education and provide the status a quality program has earned.

CM CARES: FIVE YEARS OF CHANGING LIVES

At **Colorado State University**, it began as a commitment to expand students' teamwork and leadership abilities. It became an initiative to change lives in the community. For five years, students in CM have dedicated a portion of their academic time to service learning and making a difference for people in need through CM Cares.

Eighteen projects have been completed throughout northern Colorado, all with the support of more than 100 donors and volunteers. Construction companies are eager to sponsor the projects each spring and lend their own hands in serving the community. "It has been a real honor to mentor and work alongside the CSU CM students as they serve the community through this program," said Jared Hoeflich of Swinerton Builders. "CM Cares provides an opportunity for the students to really gain perspective and to experience what true leadership is all about as they work to improve the lives of very deserving people."


The students leading the projects go into their work with the goal to better someone's day-to-day life and come away having changed their own as well. "I didn't know what to expect in this program, but I knew I'd enjoy it," said Michelle Meis ('14), a leader on the Kennedy Project. "I learned about who people are as humans and it's great that the department supports this type of development for students."

CM Cares has been honored with several recognitions for its commitment to the community, such as the 2013 Service Provider of the Year award from the Fort Collins Commission on Disability, the Associated General Contractors' 2013 Construction Education Challenge Award, and features in multiple news outlets including *ABC News*, the *Fort Collins Coloradoan*, the *Loveland Reporter Herald*, *Good Morning America*, and *The Week*. It has also been featured in a new publication by the Phamaly Theater Company in Denver that highlights 63 individuals and groups that have made a difference in the disability community. *Unsung to Unstoppable: Voices from the Disability Community* is an ebook available for download at www.phamaly.org.

The truest honors, though, came from the beneficiaries of the projects themselves. Katie Waechter, mother of James and Libby who received a wheelchair swing in their backyard along with other home modifications, was overjoyed by the "Wonderland" that CM students had created for her children and the new freedoms they've achieved thanks to their project. "This program has made such a huge impact on our lives," she said. "Everyone that came into our home treated us with such respect, they enjoyed what they were doing, and became dear friends. Thank you for giving our family this gift, for loving my children, and for making such a lasting change in our lives. We will be forever grateful."

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
Around ACCE


◆ IN MEMORIAM ◆
